Suicide and Seamen

Just like our homes, ships have their own atmosphere. Some are warm and friendly while others are cold and hostile, especially when it comes to sharing the Gospel.

I would like to tell you about an encounter I had, one that was very different from anything I had experienced before or have gone through since. It occurred on an Indian ship named *Kali*.

A large swastika was painted on the ship's bow, something I thought was kind of unusual. But, as the saying goes, "You should not judge a book by its cover." So, neither should I judge a crew by the looks of their ship. However the atmosphere on this ship was bleaker than any I had ever experienced before; it was downright depressing. On further investigation I found out why: one of its crew had committed suicide. This was sad indeed. But, my question was "WHY?"


Upon entering the crew's mess room I suddenly found myself face to face with a large poster of the Hindu goddess Kali. It was the most depressing/evil picture I have ever seen of a god. This was a goddess who had killed many men and whose skulls were draped around her neck like a long shoal. Her foot was standing on the neck of the next victim who was about to become her next trophy. How very depressing!

Appalled, I asked one of the seamen: "Do you worship this god? You should tear this picture off of the wall and dump it in the deepest ocean." It was probably the worst thing I could have said and, in response, the crew then told me to leave their ship.

Suicide is not only a problem in our society but also

among ships' crews. Fifteen percent of all deaths among seafarers are the result of suicide, according to a 2017 report by UK P&I Club. In terms of the causes, young age, isolation and social media were listed. Social media contributed because of the increased availability of news about problems at home.

I personally believe there is another cause of suicide among seafarers: guilt. The lifestyle of some crew members will lead to depression and they are afraid to face families when returning home. This is another reason why the ministry of LHM is so important. As a Mission we can proclaim that Jesus Christ can wash away all of our sins and that the Lord will remember our sins no more. (Jeremiah 31:34)



One day prior to our meeting, Christian had prayed with his wife about his discouragement and God then connected the seafarer and me in a marvelous way. After speaking with each other for an hour On a recent morning I planned to visit a terminal where two ships were berthed. I could not board the first vessel because the gangway was up and there was nobody in sight on the deck. God directs our steps, I believe, so I went to the second ship.

After boarding the second vessel, I was directed to the crew's mess room. There I met Elmer, a Filipino second engineer. Following some initial conversation I asked him how he would get to heaven (when he died). His response showed me that he was a Christian. We were both very happy to meet each other and had an encouraging time of fellowship together. Elmer belongs to a Baptist church in the Philippines where he sometimes gives sermons. Aboard his ship, Elmer is a faithful witness

for the Lord and holds a Bible study every Sunday.

In order to facilitate Elmer's maritime ministry, I left him briefly in order to obtain for him a set of Bible studies from the Seafarers Centre. However, when I arrived back at his ship I discovered that he was busy so I left the booklets aboard. As I was leaving, though, I heard a call from the deck; Elmer had received the studies and, as a result, had left his work to come and see me again. The picture (below) shows us on deck with Elmer holding the Bible study material.

I thank God that He directed my meeting with Elmer. Such encounters encourage Christian seafarers in the knowledge that God has not forgotten them and is with them even in spiritually adverse circumstances. Meetings like this also give Lighthouse workers encouragement to know that God leads us to those who are His or of His calling.
